North Dakota State Fair celebrates record-breaking year

Leaders of the 2012 North Dakota State Fair were determined not to focus on numbers. The 2010 Fair set the attendance bar high with, 308,641 visitors. And there was no Fair in 2011, with the grounds under more than 10 feet of Mouse River flood. But Fair Manager Renae Korslien need not have worried. A total of 310, 889 people flocked to the Fairgrounds July 20-28, to see a great concert line-up including everything from Kid Rock to Blake Shelton.

Weather, which Korslien described as "perfect" the first eight days, brewed up a threatening wind storm just as the grand finale, a Foreigner concert, was set to take the main stage. After Foreigner rocked out their first song, safety precautions were taken and the grandstand was cleared. The concert was postponed for approximately an hour and a half but weather cleared and Foreigner took the stage ready to wow the crowd.

Korslien praised both the concert-goers and staff, who moved visitors from the Grandstand to safe quarters under the Grandstand and the State Fair Center. The stands were cleared in 7 minutes. Foreigner also received their share of praise: "They each assured me they would play their full concert when the storm blew by, and they did," the manager said.

The fireworks which traditionally end the Fair went on, too. "We are so pleased

with attendance," Korslien said, "but success hasn't been measured in numbers.."

There were no complaints about numbers at events either: Kid Rock, 14,887; the Zac Brown Band, 14,307; Blake Shelton, 13,329; Luke Bryan, 11,967; Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, 6,179; Chris Young, 6,530 and Foreigner, 8,252. "Fairgoers showed they also like our other attractions," she said, "with 3,629 at the Enduro race and 2,249 watching the IMCA and Stock Cars. NPRA

Bull Riding Championships drew in 2,731 in two nights; and 2,451 attended the ranch rodeos that are growing in popularity.

The free pony and horse pulls, draft horse events, and 4-H and FFA livestock shows also drew in a large crowd. Not to mention a dozen free stages that covered everything from alligators to racing pigs to motorcycle stunts. While a total hasn't been received yet on competitive exhibits entered at the Fair, the State Fair Center and barns were packed with many static and livestock entries from a number of open class, 4-H and FFA exhibitors.

"We have so much to be grateful for this year," Korslien said. "One major blessing is that we were able to put on an exciting, safe family event for people, especially



those in the Mouse River Valley who have had such a tough year enduring and recovering from the flood last summer. I can't pay enough of a tribute to our staff, especially the grounds crew who put in countless hours to make sure the North Dakota State Fairgrounds were well maintained with beautiful grass and trees. And they did all that in addition to the usual Fair duties of setting up and moving stages, keeping bathrooms and showers working and moving in over 600 vendors.

"The 2012 North Dakota State Fair has been excellent, the staff is now looking forward to planning the 2013 Fair which will be held July 19-27," said Korslien.

Area educators attend Northern Plains Writing Project

More than 24 North Dakota educators were on Minot State University's campus and in Bismarck for MSU's annual Northern Plains Writing Project Summer Institute and Advanced Summer Institute. The Summer Institute started July 9 and ran through Aug. 2, while the Advanced Summer Institute began July 16, and continues to Aug. 2. NPWP is in its ninth year of instruction.

"As a site of the National Writing Project, the NPWP Summer Institute offers teachers a place to read and discuss ideas about teaching writing and using writing to teach — plus time to write," said Ron Fischer, associate English professor and NPWP co-director. "Readings include common and grade-specific selections

to meet the needs and interests of all teachers participating in the institute. Teachers also share best teaching practices through hands-on teaching demonstrations and explore the teaching of writing by writing."

NPWP invites teachers of any subject, at any grade level, to participate. Individuals receive a stipend to reimburse tuition cost. They also receive books and a supportive community of fellow teachers. Institute fellows are eligible for six graduate credits through MSU.

NDCPD awarded \$533,000 to fight Medicare fraud

The North Dakota Center for Persons with Disabilities on Minot State University's campus recently received a three-year \$533,000 federal grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. This grant will assist the North Dakota Senior Medicare Patrol program in continuing efforts to combat Medicare fraud.

Surrey Safe Routes began in July

The City of Surrey was awarded funding through the Safe Routes to Schools program to construct sidewalks throughout portions of the city. Underground storm sewer and pipe installation work began in July, with construction of the sidewalk to follow. The project is anticipated to take two weeks to complete, given ideal weather conditions.

Sidewalks will be constructed from 3rd Street South to 1st Street South along Pleasant Avenue, on the East side of the roadway, and on 2nd Street SE from Pleasant Avenue to Surrey School, on the North side of the roadway. The Pleasant Avenue stretch will include a six foot sidewalk and the 2nd Street portion will be constructed as a five foot sidewalk.

The Safe Routes to Schools initiative provides Federal funding for the construction of sidewalks to safely get children to and from their schools. The funding is distributed through the ND Department of Transportation. The Surrey Safe Routes to School project was awarded to contractor Ti-Zack Concrete, Inc. at a bid of \$158,445.

City of Burlington annexes over 700 acres for new developments

Following the Mouse River flood of 2011, the City of Burlington has seen many changes and much progress in the rebuilding and growing of the community. This month, Burlington saw their growth reach a new level when the Burlington City Council voted to annex a sig-

nificant parcel of property into the city for future development projects.

More than 700 acres of land located southeast of Burlington was recently annexed by the City of Burlington for the creation of two separate developments. Master plans for the entire property require that the acreage include both mixed use and commercial space.

Owner/developer Joel Feist is planning the Pointe of View Third Subdivision, which is comprised of 187 acres of land. The second development, known as the Highlands Ranch Subdivision, includes 535 acres of land. The Highlands Ranch Subdivision project is being planned by owner/developer Colton Lee Communities and Gary Gorian. Both projects are in their infancy, but city officials and developers are anticipating a timely development schedule with the first round of homes being completed in the spring of 2013.

Jerome Gruenberg, Mayor, City of Burlington said "We're excited to see our community thriving, especially with all of the challenges we have endured, but we also want to ensure that we can appropriately manage the growth that we are experiencing." The advance planning that is currently taking place among the city officials, school officials and the developers will help to make certain that this significant new growth does not create additional challenges for the City of Burlington and its residents. Future meetings are being planned to address concerns of city officials and residents during this transition time. Additional information will be provided to the public once those details are finalized and the developments are further along in the planning process. The two developments combined have the potential to more than quadruple the population of Burlington by adding approximately 5,000 residents to the current population of 1,100. "Burlington residents look forward to welcoming new neighbors to our family friendly, progressive community" Gruenberg stated.
