# Rodeo returns with weekend full of western experience

For the 58th year, the Minot Y's Men will host its annual rodeo. The Minot Y's Men's Rodeo will take place Oct. 4-7 at the ND State Fair Center in Minot.

It is the championship rodeo for the best cowboys and cowgirls in North and South Dakota, where they will compete for gold buckles, saddles, and the title of Badlands Circuit champion.

The rodeo is important to the community of Minot and the state, said mayor Curt Zimbelman. "It's been around for a long time, and is a great attraction for rodeo fans in the area."

The weekend is billed as a western celebration, with a Cowboy Christmas trade show, Wild West Rodeo for Special Kids, Kiwanis pancake feed, a ranch rodeo, and the crowning of the 2013 Miss Rodeo

North Dakota.

New this year is a concert by country music band Little Texas. They will play following the Oct. 6 night of rodeo.

Monies raised from the Minot Y's Men's Rodeo benefit the Triangle Y Camp at Garrison, ND.

"The rodeo has a strong base of volunteers," Zimbelman said. "A tremendous number of volunteers, and their money goes to help others. I think that's a really important thing."

the rodeo.

It's the Bedazzled Bras, a unique exhibit hosted by the ND State Fair this past July, where 30 bras were designed and entered in the contest.

The public was invited to decorate a bra in one of five categories: Pretty in Pink, Rodeo, Agriculture/Livestock, Calendar Girls, and Spirit of America.

Entries were varied and unique, said NDSF Marketing Coordinator Jennifer Ashley. "They were beautiful. It's crazy how cool they were." One of the entries included a bra made entirely of duct tape, with the words "holding it together" written on the inside. Some of the

bras included elaborate beadwork. The winning western bra was made of hand-kerchiefs, cowboy hats, and had lights sewn into it.

The winning bras will be auctioned off during Business After Hours Oct. 3, with funds raised going to the Trinity Health Care Exercise Rehab Program at the Minot Family YMCA.

# Y's Men's rodeo raises money to help recovering cancer patients

Not that anyone wants to get cancer to find out, but for Minot resident Jody Petry, she can count some good things that came out of having cancer.

Petry was diagnosed with liver cancer in March of last year, and after chemotherapy, she was so weak she could barely walk around the neighborhood cul-de-sac.

Her doctor, Dr. Makoni, recommended she enroll in the Trinity Health Cancer Rehab Exercise program at the Minot YMCA. He said it would help her fatigue

Russell Gust, exercise rehab program director, worked with Jody, and designed a workout specifically for her. And even though she was fatigued from chemo treatments, the exercise was good. "Some days I'd be so weak and tired, and

I'd rate my fatigue level high when I got to the Y. But I also noticed that when I left, I felt better and my fatigue level had gone down."

The strength building isn't the only benefit to the Exercise Rehab Program. Jody met other people fighting cancer, "wonderful people" She became friends with Val Babb, another Minot resident who was fighting cancer. They exercised together and the friendship evolved. "Val and I just hit it off. We've been known to do a lot of talking during our exercising."

The program is funded in part by the Tough Enough to Wear Pink campaign, in conjunction with the Minot Y's Men's Rodeo. The Tough Enough to Wear Pink campaign raises money through the sale of t-shirts and other pink merchandise at the ND State Fair, and WGO and the Zoo

radio remotes throughout the Minot area. In the past five years, it has raised over \$247,770.00 for the program.

The Minot Y's Men's Rodeo will host a Tough Enough to Wear Pink night on Friday, Oct. 5. Fans are asked to wear pink, and the t-shirts will be on sale that night.

Jody's cancer is in remission, but she's still enrolled in the program. She continues to exercise, and recommends the program to others. "People who have cancer, I tell them, 'you have to talk to your doctor. You need to work out. I'm a person who never exercised in my life. But I've changed my tune."

The rodeo is sponsored by Touchstone Energy Electric Cooperatives and 4-Bears Casino & Lodge.

# Community partners invited to support "USAF Recognition Project"

The significance of the 5th Bomb Wing and the 91st Missile Wing headquartered at Minot Air Force Base cannot be understated. The military services in the Minot community have an annual half billion dollar impact on our region with many intangible benefits, such as spousal employment when our need for workers in this area is so critical. It is important that community members honor the military, thank them for their service, and help establish a permanent tribute through this "USAF Recognition Project."

As we celebrate the 60th anniversary of the B52, it is also a time to provide a tribute in the form of a B52 model. It becomes

additionally important given the fact that the last B52 produced is stationed at MAFB.


### Minot Area Community Foundation's Cornerstone Society Spotlight on Arnold Besserud

Arnold Besserud was an extraordinarily modest and unassuming person. Arnold was a long-time resident of Minot who enjoyed gardening, reading, and learning about economics and investments. Although he traveled the world as a civil engineer with the U.S. Corps of Engineers, he lived humbly, had little family, and established his family of friends through the soup kitchens and meal programs throughout Minot. He partook of those programs, sharing meals and establishing friendships with those in attendance.

When he died, he asked that the Minot Area Community Foundation see that his legacy went toward two goals: first to help support Minot soup kitchens and meal programs, and second to support the other needs in the community as identified by the Foundation. Mr. Besserud asked that the Foundation use his gift to create an endowment fund in order to ensure that his gift will help the people of the area for many years to come.

The Arnold I. Besserud Endowment Fund is projected to generate more than \$100,000 per year for the Foundation to distribute in the Minot area. These monies will go both toward the emerging needs in the community and the programs nearest and dearest to Mr. Besserud's heart: the meal programs conducted by several of our local churches. Arnold Besserud has certainly left a legacy in Minot that will impact our community for many years to come.

## Fast facts about Social Security

SSA's Office of Retirement and Disability Policy recently released the 2012 edition of Fast Facts & Figures about Social Security.

The direct link is www.ssa.gov/policy/docs/chartbooks/fast\_facts/2012/in dex.html.

This annual publication highlights basic program data for the Social Security (OASDI = retirement (old age), survivors, and disability insurance) and Supplemental Security Income programs. The tables and charts illustrate the range of program beneficiaries, from the country's oldest to its youngest citizens. In all, about 60.4 million people receive some type of benefit or assistance.

#### Did you know that...

- SSA paid benefits to about 60.4 million people in 2011.
- Social Security provided at least half the income for 65 percent of the aged beneficiaries in 2010.
- Social Security benefits were awarded to about 5.6 million people in 2011.
- Women accounted for 56 percent of adult Social Security beneficiaries in 2011.
- The average age of disabled-worker beneficiaries was 53.0 in 2011.
- Eighty-five percent of SSI recipients received payments because of disability or blindness in 2011.

#### MSU releases fall enrollment numbers

Minot State University official fall 2012 enrollment numbers show a 2.7 percent decrease compared to official numbers last year of 3,657. The number reported to the North Dakota University system is 3,560.

"Numbers indicate we are doing a good job of recruiting outside of our area, and that MSU's message of being a solid institution with fine academic programs is making inroads," said MSU President David Fuller. "However, housing and the energy industry continue to impact us locally."

Enrollment declines are most prevalent in new freshmen and graduate, Minot Air Force Base and Native American students. Ward County showed a 5 percent total decrease. Other counties showing decreased enrollment trends include many in oil patch country, such as Divide, Williams and Mountrail.

Grow North Dakota, an MSU endeavor to recruit out-of-state and international students by charging a flat tuition rate, fostered growth in student populations from exterior states such as Arizona, California, Florida and Michigan. Increases were also seen in transfer and international students.

North Dakota counties that show enrollment increases include Burke, Burleigh, Cass and Grand Forks.

"Our university still has considerable work to address the effects of the devastating Souris River Flood, the resulting housing shortages and the corresponding enrollment challenges. I am confident that we are making good progress on each of those, but there is still a lot of work remaining," he said.

Following his arrival in 2004, Fuller developed a seven-year proposal focused on MSU's 2013 Centennial. The subsequent plan, known as "Vision 2013," outlined strategies and tactics to raise awareness of MSU beyond northwestern North Dakota and achieve national distinction in the upper Great Plains region. As a result, MSU underwent several initiatives to strengthen campus infrastructure, enhance academic programs and heighten its commitment to student success through on and off-campus learning experiences.

Fuller is MSU's eighth president.
