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Minot gearing up for 2013 legislative session

The Minot Area Chamber of Commerce has been preparing for the 2013 Legislative session. Members of the Board of Directors have been meeting with local lawmakers and agencies to prepare for what is ahead. Members from the Minot Public School District, Minot Convention and Visitors Bureau, Ward County Commission, Minot City Council, Minot Area Development Corporation, the North Dakota State Fair, and Minot State University were on hand during these meetings to visit with legislators from districts 3, 5, 38 and 40 on issues facing the area.

Chamber President, John MacMartin said, "The Chamber is working to protect the interests of this area and it's important for us to be prepared prior to the opening of the session. Minot is known for working together to get things done; this year is no different." The Minot Chamber supports tax reform and the efforts of the Greater North Dakota Chamber in changes to the state's tax structure. The proposal would reduce individual income tax by one third, business tax by one third and property tax by one third. The reduction of the individual income tax would mean an additional \$981.94 for the average North Dakotan with a median income of \$50,847 in the 2011 tax return. The business tax reduction would mean a \$60 million tax cut for businesses in North Dakota. The property tax reduction would mean \$540 million of property tax relief to residents and business owners.

Chamber members are encouraged to attend the Legislative Forums to bring issues to the lawmakers and learn what has been happening in Bismarck. The schedule is below.

Forums offer chance for legislative input

The 2013 ND Legislative Session will begin soon, The Minot Area Chamber of Commerce will once again host the Saturday Legislative Forums beginning Jan. 19 at 9 a.m. in the Norsk Room at the North Dakota State Fair Center.

"The forums offer opportunities for the business community to learn about bills being discussed at the legislature and also to ask questions or give input to area lawmakers," Chamber President John MacMartin said. "Chamber members, business owners, and the community are all invited to learn about the latest legislative activity in Bismarck."

The format allows for those attending to submit written questions, which are given to a moderator who then addresses them to the appropriate legislator. The schedule below is subject to change.

City estimates 80% of flood-damaged homes rehabbed

The City of Minot estimates almost 80 percent of those homes most heavily damaged by 2011 flooding are repaired and currently being lived in, or are very close to being habitable. The City experienced record flooding from the Mouse River in 2011, causing main floor damage to 2,716 homes in the valley.

"There are about 600 homes that do not appear to have sufficient repairs done to make them livable," said Kevin Ternes, the city assessor and head of the department that verified the status of flood-damaged properties. "Now it's possible that some of these have had some interior wiring or exterior work, but the result of this visual survey is that the City has more than 2,100 of the homes that experienced main floor damage back in use or soon-to-be livable at this point."

This assessment comes nine months after

the City's most recent complete verification of the homes most heavily damaged after the 2011 flood. The 2,716 homes that suffered main-floor damage or greater were those that generally took longer to repair at greater cost to the homeowner.

Based on this survey and the best information available, Ternes estimates 185 homes in Minot have been demolished in the past 17 months, while approximately 125 homes appear not to have been cleaned out or "gutted" since the June 2011 flood. There are houses in both of these categories that have been or could be bought by the City through the voluntary property acquisition process.

The City Assessor's survey of flooded homes with main floor damage did not include assessments of apartment buildings of four or more units, commercial buildings or mobile homes.

Since the 2011 flood, a commonly-stated fact has transformed into something inaccurate. According to GIS mapping, FEMA follow-up surveys and aerial photography, it was stated very soon after the flood that 4,100 structures were impacted by flood waters. This count includes detached garages, large sheds, mobile homes, apartment complexes, commercial buildings or any other identifiable structures within the flood. The City of Minot estimates that roughly 600 mobile homes and 200 commercial buildings were damaged in the 2011 flooding. As for estimates on homes with basement-only flooding, the City does not have a firm number of those impacted this way, but does suppose that nearly all of the homes with basement-only flooding were back in use within six months of the Mouse River flood.

These exhibits include items entered in competition at the Fair and then are displayed or presented during the Fair. First place awards received in the Competitive Exhibits Category include: Competitive Exhibit Display Method, New or Unique Division and Competitive Exhibit Photo Series.

The purpose of the IAFE Agricultural Awards is to improve the agricultural educational programs of fairs, to help fairs determine ways they

SSWO-Fargo fights hunger and homelessness in Minot and Fargo

Last March, Minot State University social work students instituted a branch of the Student Social Work Organization in Fargo. SSWO-Fargo's members are students enrolled in a dual degree program between MSU's social work program and North Dakota State University's human development family science program. Although in its infancy, the student organization immediately began calling attention to issues.

Throughout early November, SSWO-Fargo collected money, groceries and supplies for the Minot Area Homeless Coalition. It collected more than \$600 plus food and supplies, which will be delivered to Minot for the Minot Area Homeless Coalition during the semester break.

To fundraise and bring awareness of hunger and homelessness in North Dakota, SSWO-Fargo collaborated with the Fargo-Moorhead Coalition for Homeless Persons during National Hunger and Homeless Awareness Week, Nov. 10-18.

"Typically, homelessness is only thought of in terms of financial resources, but there are many factors that lead to homelessness. Loss of employment, long-term illness, substance abuse, divorce, domestic violence, child abuse, institutional release and other factors create situations when people cannot afford to pay rent or house payments," said Deb Dewitz, SSWO-Fargo advisor. "Additional causes may be attributed to defects in the system, such as lack of affordable housing, space in treatment facilities for persons suffering from mental illness or substance

abuse and preventive services to help people remain in their homes."

Nov. 13, members coordinated Miss-a-Meal, an evening event with Bingo, raffle prizes and a guest speaker from the North Dakota Coalition for Homeless People. Students went without eating from lunch on Nov. 13 until breakfast on Nov. 14 to experience missing just one meal.



Nov. 15 was One Day Without a Home. Participants stood in the cold and "froze" to experience homelessness firsthand for 24 hours, on the corner of 12th Avenue N. and University in Fargo; community members dropped off food or monetary contributions.

From its National Hunger and Homeless Awareness Week community-service projects, SSWO-Fargo also collected over \$1,000 for the Fargo-Moorhead Area Homeless Coalition and more than 700 pounds of food for the Great Plains Food Bank. The Great Plains Food Bank combats hunger across the state.

Earlier this semester, SSWO-Fargo participated in Fargo's Out of the Darkness Community Walk for the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention and "Take Back the Night" event, a sexual assault prevention program.

Otto Bremer Foundation awards \$15,000 grant to Souris Valley United Way

More kids in the Minot area will have a chance to pick up a book and read, thanks to an Otto Bremer Foundation grant to the Souris Valley United Way. The \$15,000 grant will help support the Dolly Parton Imagination Library program. The program provides free books to young children under the age of five.

"This will really help us expand our program," Patricia Smith, executive director of the Souris Valley United Way said. "It will encourage parents to read to their children. It will not only prepare them for school, but get them excited about reading and learning."

Nearly 700 children are receiving a free book every month through the program. With this grant, the Souris Valley United Way expects to grow that number to 1,400 children and expand the area served.

"Currently, kids in Minot, the Air Force Base, Velva, and Burlington can sign up for the books. With this grant, we can help even more kids in our area by extending the program into Surrey, Sawyer, and Granville," Smith explained. Any



child under the age of five that lives in those

associated zip codes can sign up to receive books.
