Y's Men's Rodeo adds crane operators' competition

They're an elite bunch; independence and resilience runs through their veins. They're highly respected for what they do, and they're high profile. No, it's not just the cowboys at the Minot Y's Men's Rodeo, but there's a new "gun" in town...crane operators.

For the first time, the Y's Men's Rodeo will host a crane operator and rigger skills competition on the Saturday of rodeo weekend. The crane operator's clinic, formerly called a crane rodeo, is a way for crane operators to showcase their skills in a competition with other operators. It takes a lot of skill to be a crane operator, using machinery to transport heavy loads, like construction materials around a job site, or earth around a mine.

"Crane operators are an elite group," said Debbie Dickinson, executive director of the Crane Institute Certification, "who are often the most visible link in the (work) chain."

Crane operator competitions have been going on since 2011. They've grown to nine regional competitions across the nation. The two top winners from the Minot competition will go on to the championship event, which will be held in the fall of 2015 in conjunction with a nationwide construction equipment trade show.

The crane competition was a natural fit for the Y's Men's Rodeo, says Max Weppler, committeeman with the rodeo. "There are cranes all over the state with the oil business, and it's big business in North

Crane operators will compete in three events: the headache ball challenge (placing the headache ball into barrels); maneuvering 55-gallon drums of water through an obstacle course; and raising a pipe to a vertical position then placing it between a set of cones. The operator is also assessed on his knowledge of basic rigging principles.

The crane operator competition runs from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Oct. 11 at the State Fair Center. Crane operators can sign up to compete by visiting www.craneinstitutecertification.com/news/regional-events/.



Social Security agency resumes mailing statements

The Social Security agency will resume periodic mailing of Social Security Statements — once every five years for most workers — while encouraging everyone to create a secure my Social Security account to immediately access their statement online, anytime. The statement is a valuable financial planning tool providing adult workers with important individualized information regarding earnings, tax contributions, and estimates for future retirement, disability, and survivors benefits.

Beginning this month, workers attaining ages 25, 30, 35, 40, 45, 50, 55, and 60 who are not receiving Social Security benefits and who are not

registered for a my Social Security account will receive the Statement in the mail about 3 months before their birthday. After age 60, people will receive a Statement every year. The agency expects to send nearly 48 millionStatements each year.

The Social Security Statement helps people plan for their financial future. In addition to providing future benefit estimates, the Statement highlights a person's complete earnings history, allowing workers to verify the accuracy of their earnings. This is important because an individual's future benefit amount is determined by the amount of their earnings over their

lifetime. To date, more than 14 million people have established a personalized my Social Security account

at www.socialsecurity.gov/myaccount.

With a my Social Security account, people may access the statement from the comfort of their home, office or library whenever they choose. Individuals who currently receive benefits should sign up for a my Social Security account to manage their benefit payments and, when the need arises, get an instant benefit verification letter, change their address and phone number, and start or change direct deposit of their benefit payment.

NDCPD, RCJC, and NDDoH to provide suicide prevention training

Minot State University's North Dakota Center for Persons with Disabilities and Rural Crime and Justice Center and the North Dakota Department of Health, Suicide Prevention Program are collaborating on a new project for suicide prevention. The North Dakota Suicide Prevention and Incarceration Project is designed to provide law enforcement and jail personnel with training and information on policies, procedures and operations techniques to reduce suicides and suicide attempts in jails.

Brent Askvig, NDCPD executive director and this project's director, indicated that the program will bring in a nationally recognized consultant to train law enforcement and jail personnel of safety, security and policy issues.
