Prairie Warrior Auction celebrates 30 years of TEAM MINOT spirit

In its previous 29 years, the annual Military Affairs Committee Prairie Warrior Competition has raised more than a half a million dollars. This includes expenses incurred by competition teams, squadron activities and annual awards banquets. Funds also go to the Thanksgiving baskets project during the holiday season and Operation Warmheart, a program for families in need.

The 30th annual auction, set for

Saturday, March 19, will be held in the Holiday Inn in Minot with a preview of auction merchandise beginning at 5:30 p.m. The live auction, with auctioneer John Bearman, will begin at 6:30 p.m. Refreshments and hors d'oeuvres will be served, and there is a \$25 charge at the door.

Minot awarded \$74.3 million in HUD resilience competition

U.S. Senators Heidi Heitkamp (D-ND) and John Hoeven (R-ND) announced that the City of Minot has been awarded \$74.3 Million in the National Disaster Resilience Competition. At a press conference at Minot's City Hall, Mayor Chuck Barney said that the City should be proud and excited about the announcement.

"This is certainly great news for the



City of Minot," Barney said. "Everyone who has worked so tirelessly over the past year to insure our success should be proud on this historic day. The entire community has always shown how resilient we are in the face of a challenge, and these federal funds will move us to the next level in being prepared against natural disasters, economic disasters, and so many other stresses that this competition has helped us realize were a threat to our city."

City Manager Lee Staab added that the community as a whole was integral to the outcome of the competition. "During this competition, we were told over and over that input from the community was paramount to our success, and the residents of Minot and the Souris River Basin showed up in a big way to make sure that we would be noticed, and that we would be successful." Staab added that the support of the community was evident throughout the entire process. "We held over 60 public meetings here in Minot and up and down the Souris River basin. We heard from a wide range of folks who opened our eyes to what we need to do in order to be more resilient. All of the effort from each of you who participated has paid off in a big way today."

Minot was one of 13 communities selected from 40 applications to receive an award. The applicants included both cities and states. The funds will help Minot both recover from the previous disaster and make plans, decisions, and investments that make them more resilient to the next disaster. The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and the Rockefeller Foundation will outline the specific projects that will be funded later this week.

Ag Committee sponsors grain marketing workshop March 17

The Minot Area Chamber of Commerce Agribusiness Committee will sponsor "Five Common Mistakes in Grain Marketing" Thursday, March 17 at the North Central Research Extension Center. Participants may choose to attend the 10 a.m. session, which includes lunch at 11:30 a.m., or the 1 p.m. session, which begins with lunch at 12:15 p.m.

Edward Usset, a grain marketing economist for the Center for Farm Financial Management at the University of Minnesota, will offer a different approach to marketing. He will identify common mistakes in grain marketing, including the reluctance toward preharvest marketing, lack of an exit strategy, and holding grain in storage too long. Discover that great marketing is not predicting prices, but eliminating mistakes in everyday decisions. See how eliminating mistakes can create a solid foundation in the development of marketing plans. Participants can apply these techniques and lessons to the development of a pre-harvest marketing plan.

Usset is the developer of the "Winning the Game" series of workshops. He also manages Commodity Challenge, an online marketing education game that uses real-time cash and futures data. The second edition of his book, *Grain Marketing Is Simple (It's Just Not Easy)*," was released in November 2015.

It is the goal of the NPCAC to provide a compassionate and effective way to bring services to children victimized by abuse. This public-private collaboration significantly reduces the trauma associated with reporting child abuse and holds offenders accountable.

Out-of-pocket expenses for the services of the NPCAC are not the responsibility of the family. The NPCAC is solely funded from grants, reimbursements, donations, and fundraisers.

MSU history professors receive grant to preserve Minot's heritage

The National Endowment of the Humanities recently awarded Professors Bethany Andreasen and Dan Ringrose of the Minot State University History Department a grant to preserve Minot's common heritage. History students and faculty will host digitization days at the Minot Public Library and area assisted living centers, where members of the public will be invited to share photographs, artifacts, family letters and artworks related to family and community history.

Items will be digitized, along with descriptive information and context provided by the community attendees. Contributors will receive a free digital copy of their items as well as advice on preservation and tips for handling flooddamaged materials.

With the owner's permission, the digitized materials will be made publicly available through the Digital Minot Project (http://digitalminot.minotstateu. edu/dm2015/). Sessions will be followed by electronic exhibits at the Digital Minot Project, as well as by a public presentation on community history in the fall.

Andreasen and Ringrose's grant proposal identified the motivation for the project as the desire to document the community's identity at a time when Minot is rapidly transforming after a disastrous flood and by significant population and industrial growth related to the explosion of oil activity in the region.

Andreasen has worked in local history projects for several years, supervising history students in internships as part of the Digital Minot Project.

"I appreciate the opportunity to guide history majors in interacting with the public at these digitization days, and in the research that follows, as it provides them with practical, hands-on experience in the field of history," Andreasen said.

Ringrose's work in digital history includes supporting the technology behind Digital Minot, the Veterans History Project and an online archival project digitizing letters from 19th century France.

"This grant supports an exciting partnership with Janet Anderson, Minot Public Library director, to preserve memories and documents from individuals across our community," Ringrose said.

This grant is among the first of 38 national awards made under NEH's Common Heritage grant program. Created in April 2015, this program is part of "The Common Good: The Humanities in the Public Square," an agency-wide initiative that seeks to enhance the role of the humanities in civic life (http://www.neh.gov/common-good).

The digitization day at the Minot Public Library will take place in early March.
