

DVCC meets goal for Construction Loan Challenge Grant

The Domestic Violence Crisis Center (DVCC) announces that the goal for the construction loan challenge grant has been met. The DVCC needed to raise \$165,000 to meet a local family's challenge and fully fund the construction loan on the New Beginnings Campus.

Earlier this spring, a challenge came from Mark Tollefson, in memory of Lori Tollefson, and Roger and Michelle Tollefson. The two families each pledged \$250,000 toward the existing construction loan if DVCC could raise the remaining balance of \$165,000.

The DVCC was met with an outpouring of community support through several different fundraisers. Together, these events raised the remaining funds needed to meet the \$165,000 goal, which will pay off the loan in full.

"We at DVCC are so grateful to our community for their financial gifts to meet the challenge and giving us the ability to pay off the construction loan," said Dena Filler, executive director of the Domestic Violence Crisis Center. "When state grant dollars were frozen it was a giant challenge to have the community come forward to assist us. I am overwhelmed by the community support DVCC has received. We live in a generous community."

Minot's own children's museum to kick off third season on Nov. 2,

The Magic City Discovery Center will open its doors for a third season on Wednesday, Nov. 2. Featured this year will be "The Science of an Amusement Park" exhibit designed to explore the science behind traditional amusement park rides through hands-on activities geared toward eager minds of all ages.

"We are excited to once again be located inside the Dakota Territory Air Museum just north of the airport off of Broadway and proud to be able to feature a new exhibit that takes children and their parents behind the scenes of an amusement park, exploring the physics behind the fun," said Children's Museum of Minot Board President Jessica Henderson. "Thanks to the dedicated board volunteers and hired staff who will keep the children's museum open during the upcoming winter months. Please come check out what's new and experience your favorite exhibits from previous seasons as well!"

Admission to this season's Magic City Discovery Center is available at the same, reasonable price of \$4/person (\$15 maximum per family) with those 12 months and younger getting in free. The \$7,500 donation will go toward exhibits in this year's museum and future endeavors by the non-profit board to continue outreach into schools.

"As a group of dedicated cooperatives we are always interested in the quality of life available in our service area and love to support programs geared toward children and families."

North Dakota Navigator Project ready for open enrollment

The North Dakota Center for Persons with Disabilities, a center of excellence at Minot State University, was recently awarded \$300,000 as a cooperative agreement with the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid to assist North Dakota consumers in accessing health insurance through the federal Marketplace with the North Dakota Navigator Project. This is the fourth year of funding and will support the efforts to bring awareness of the Affordable Care Act at the local level.

"Efforts have been made to inform and assist North Dakota residents in accessing health insurance," said Neil Scharpe, project director. "Through partnerships with Family Voices of North Dakota, the Federation of Families for Children's Mental Health and DLN Consulting, we have certified 12-16 Navigators each year. These people are located in the eight major cities and have responsibility to cover the counties in their region."

While Navigators are not insurance agents, they can guide consumers through choosing a plan, but even more importantly, they can help by identifying options a person may have for accessing coverage and explaining how the Affordable Care Act (aka Obamacare) works. Many residents have not considered the options which may be available to them to lower their monthly premiums or provide coverage at no cost.

This year if an individual household income is below \$16,242 and the individual is single, they could get free health insurance. If a household income is \$16,500 and the individual is 30 years old, the person could get insurance for \$80 per month with no deductible and \$750 maximum out-of-pocket expense for the year.

As the program enters its fourth year of open enrollment, accessing insurance is much easier than it was the first year or two. The system works better, but a Navigator can help guide people through the process. There is no charge, and the Navigators know the pitfalls individuals may encounter.

The N.D. Legislature authorized the Expanded Medicaid portion of the ACA in 2010 with a sunset in 2017.

"If it is to continue, the legislature will have to act this session," Scharpe said. "It has been a positive addition to the health insurance coverage options. It also assists medical facilities with patients who would not ordinarily be able to pay for services. It helps consumers receive regular preventative care, which can identify medical issues early and avoid added expenses."
