## Preliminary FEMA Risk maps now available to public

The preliminary Risk maps from FEMA are now available to the public. The new maps will effectively change the flood risk zoning of nearly 4,000 parcels of land in the valley, requiring several residents to carry flood insurance. A public open house will be held July 19, 2017, from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. at the Minot Municipal Auditorium to answer questions and address concerns the

public may have regarding the new maps. Representatives from the City of Minot, Ward County, State Water Commission, and FEMA will be available for questions.

## City of Minot construction update, levee grant award

#### Minot awarded more than \$950,000 to upgrade existing levee system

The North Dakota State Water Commission has allocated \$950,254 to the City of Minot to help cover the cost of repairs and upgrades to the city's existing levee system. This announcement marks the first time the City of Minot has been granted these funds.

"Every year we do inspections with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers on our existing levee system, and they have identified deficiencies that need to be corrected to bring the levees up to the new standards set by the Corps," said Dan Jonasson, City of Minot

#### Entrance/exit for Roosevelt Park Zoo moves to 11th Street SE

The main entrance to Roosevelt Park Zoo at 13th Street SE is closed to vehicle traffic, as construction on Burdick Expressway East progresses. Visitors can continue to use the temporary access point created at 11th Street SE, which will now serve as both the entrance and exit for the Zoo during this phase of construction. Pedestrians can also cross Burdick Expressway at 11th Street SE.

Director of Public Works. "This funding allows us to continue working on our levees to ensure they comply with the standards established by the Corps."

The levee project includes removing trees, repairing any erosion damage along the river bank and other items. The estimated cost is \$2 million for the work that will be done over the next few years.

"We're pleased that the State Water Commission takes the condition of our levee system as seriously as we do," said Minot City Manager Tom Barry. "We have a responsibility to protect our residents, and this funding will help us maintain and upgrade a vital part of our city's flood protection system. The state's assistance in this important project is greatly appreciated."

When Minot's levees were created by the Corps, the earthen structures were built around existing trees in some locations. After Hurricane Katrina devastated New Orleans and other areas in 2005, the Corps updated its standards for levees, and is now requiring upgrades and changes to meet those standards.

"The Corps had never required us to bring our levees up to their new standards before now," Jonasson said. "We put together a program that outlines the deficiencies in our levee system, and the Corps has approved our work plan. By getting this funding for the first time ever, we can move forward and execute our plan."

Roosevelt Park Zoo for the duration of the East Burdick Expressway project," said City Engineer Lance Meyer. "Even though visitors have already been using the temporary access at 11th Street SE, with the closure of the intersection at 13th Street



SE we want to reinforce that 11th Street SE will be the entrance and exit for the Zoo."

Signs have been placed on Valley Street to help direct traffic to the Zoo, Corbett Field and other locations, including the Roosevelt Plaza. Temporary traffic signals have been installed at the intersection of Valley Street and 13th Street SE and at the intersection of Valley Street and 27th Street SE to help manage the increased volume of traffic.

The Burdick Expressway East project will replace underground water, sanitary sewer, and storm sewer pipes, while widening the driving lanes. New lighting, sidewalks, traffic signals and signage will also be installed. A portion of the curve just east of 9th St. SE will be straightened for safety reasons. The intersection of Burdick Expressway and 9th Street SE has a completion date of July 18 to accommodate the North Dakota State Fair Parade. Once over the viaduct, the parade will be routed onto 9th Street SE, then onto Eastern Avenue and 8th Avenue SE before entering the North Dakota State Fairgrounds. The entire Burdick Expressway project has a completion date of Oct. 28.

## First block of road construction finished in 2017 downtown work

The only block of First Avenue SW previously under construction is now open to east/west traffic, after Keller Paving and subcontractors finished their work today. This block, from Broadway through First Street SW, was the first road closed earlier this spring and is the first to re-open to traffic. City staff responsible for the Downtown Infrastructure Improvements Project say they look forward to seeing more roads open to the public soon.

"It's nice to have good weather for construction this spring and to have a contractor finish a block prior to the Fourth of July," said City Engineer Lance Meyer.

"As hopefully everybody knows, the downtown businesses continue to be open during this final year of construction on the underground and aboveground improvements – please come and experience the new sidewalks, roads, benches, flowers,





and other amenities."

Drivers are asked to pay close attention to the construction signage when coming to downtown. Some of the best ways to get downtown are by using Main Street off Burdick Expressway, Second Avenue from either side of downtown,

and Central Avenue from the east side of downtown (Third Street).

The road still being worked on by Keller Paving is one block of North Main Street, just north of Central Avenue. This work was leftover from their 2016 contracted work in downtown. Wagner Construction's work this year includes five blocks of Third Avenue South, five blocks of First Street SW, and two blocks of Second Street East. Wagner is currently working on nine of those blocks.

## City hires special counsel for parking structure issues

The City of Minot has hired special counsel to assist with potential legal issues concerning the two downtown parking structures. The City Council approved on Tuesday the hiring of Dorsey & Whitney. The firm is headquartered in Minneapolis, MN, and currently represents the City on bond sales and pension issues.

"It's time for the City to look more

closely at all of its legal options in protecting its investments and advancing these projects for the benefit of our community," said Minot City Manager Tom Barry.

No legal action relating to the parking structures and involving the City of Minot is pending in the court system at this time, but Barry said it's essential that the City fully review its options relating to the projects. Dorsey & Whitney has expertise in, among other areas, construction law, contract review, and public/private partnership relationships. They are an international firm with more than 550 attorneys in the United States, Canada, Europe, and Asia.



#### IRS warns of new phone scam

The Internal Revenue Service today warned people to beware of a new scam linked to the Electronic Federal Tax Payment System (EFTPS), where fraudsters call to demand an immediate tax payment through a prepaid debit card. This scam is being reported across the country, so taxpayers should be alert to the details.

In the latest twist, the scammer claims to be from the IRS and tells the victim about two certified letters purportedly sent to the taxpayer in the mail but returned as undeliverable. The scam artist then threatens arrest if a payment is not made through a prepaid debit card. The scammer also tells the victim that the card is linked to the EFTPS system when, in fact, it is entirely controlled by the scammer. The victim is also warned not to contact their tax preparer, an attorney or their local IRS office until after the tax payment is made.

"This is a new twist to an old scam," said IRS Commissioner John Koskinen. "Just because tax season is over, scams and schemes do not take the summer off. People should stay vigilant against IRS impersonation scams. People should remember that the first contact they receive from IRS will not be through a random, threatening phone call."

EFTPS is an automated system for pay-

ing federal taxes electronically using the Internet or by phone using the EFTPS Voice Response System. EFTPS is offered free by the U.S. Department of Treasury and does not require the purchase of a prepaid debit card. Since EFTPS is an automated system, taxpayers won't receive a call from the IRS. In addition, taxpayers have several options for paying a real tax bill and are not required to use a specific one.

Telltale signs of a scam:

The IRS (and its authorized private collection agencies) will never:

- \* Call to demand immediate payment using a specific payment method such as a prepaid debit card, gift card or wire transfer. The IRS does not use these methods for tax payments. Generally, the IRS will first mail a bill to any taxpayer who owes taxes. All tax payments should only be made payable to the U.S. Treasury and checks should never be made payable to third parties.
- \* Threaten to immediately bring in local police or other law-enforcement groups to have the taxpayer arrested for not paying.
- \* Demand that taxes be paid without giving the taxpayer the opportunity to question or appeal the amount owed.
- \* Ask for credit or debit card numbers

over the phone.

For anyone who doesn't owe taxes and has no reason to think they do:

- \* Do not give out any information. Hang up immediately.
- \* Contact the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration to report the call. Use their IRS Impersonation Scam Reporting web page. Alternatively, call 800-366-4484.
- \* Report it to the Federal Trade Commission. Use the FTC Complaint Assistant on FTC.gov. Please add "IRS Telephone Scam" in the notes.

For anyone who owes tax or thinks they do:

- \* View your tax account information online at IRS.gov to see the actual amount you owe. You can then also review your payment options.
- \* Call the number on the billing notice, or call the IRS at 800-829-1040. IRS workers can help.

The IRS does not use email, text messages or social media to discuss personal tax issues, such as those involving bills or refunds. #### IRS approves first group of certified professional employer organizations

The Internal Revenue Service issued notices of certification to 84 organizations that applied for voluntary certification as a Certified Professional Employer Organization (CPEO).

After the IRS receives the required surety bond from an approved CPEO applicant, the IRS will publish that CPEO's name, address, and effective date of certification on IRS.gov.

Under legislation enacted in late 2014, the IRS established a voluntary certification program for professional employer organizations (PEOs). These organizations typically handle various payroll administration and tax reporting responsibilities for their business clients.

Certification affects the employment tax liabilities of both the CPEO and its clients. A CPEO is generally treated as the employer of any individual performing services for a client of the CPEO and covered by a CPEO contract between the CPEO with the client, but only for wages and other compensation paid to the individual by the CPEO.

To become and remain certified under the new program, CPEOs must meet tax compliance, background, experience, business location, financial reporting, bonding, and other requirements.

The IRS continues to process CPEO applications and those applicants not yet receiving a notice of certification will receive a decision from the IRS in coming weeks and months.

#### Trinity vendor impacted by cyberattack

Trinity Health received word that one of its vendors, Nuance Communications, Burlington, MA, had been impacted by a cyberattack originating in Europe. Trinity Health was not directly targeted.

Nuance is a multinational provider of voice and language tools, including transcription services and other programs that allow medical dictation directly into an electronic health record. It has many healthcare clients, including Trinity Health.

Karim Tripodina, Trinity's director of marketing and community relations, said the company notified its clients that it had shut down its hosted systems as a precautionary move.

"We were informed of disruptions in transcription service and advised to implement a back-up plan for clinical documentation until the outage has ended," Tripodina said.

She said Nuance is keeping clients apprised of the situation with regular communication updates, and it is working around the clock to remedy the situation with the help of leading security experts.

"According to the company there is no indication that any confidential information of its customers or patients has been removed from the network," Tripodina added. "They shut the network down to safeguard their system."


