On Feb. 1, the MAFB 5th Bomb Wing Comptroller budget office released the 2017 economic impact report during the monthly

Minot's cost of living measured at 1.8% higher than the national average for 2017, according to the Cost of Living Index, published by the Council for Community and Economic Research. The ACCRA Cost of Living Index measures differences between areas in the cost of consumer goods and services, excluding taxes and non-consumer expenditures. It is based on 100,000 data points for which prices are collected quarterly by the Minot Area Chamber of Commerce and 288 other urban areas across the nation.



Minot PD warns of scams

The Minot Police Department Crime Prevention Unit has received reports of a scam targeting area residents known as the "Money Order Scam." These recent reports indicate that classified ads are being placed (in both newspapers and online) offering employment as a caregiver for elderly patients. The would-be victim contacts the scammer and provides their name and address. The scammer then agrees to send the victim an "advance" on their pay (usually a few hundred dollars). The scammer then sends forged/counterfeit money orders or cashier's checks, for amounts well over the agreed to wage. The victim is then directed to deposit the checks, keep the agreed upon amount of money, and wire transfer the remainder to someone else. Often times the counterfeit documents are not immediately recognized, but once the financial institution realizes the error, the account holder is responsible for reimbursement of the full amount of the money. In most cases this money is next to impossible to recover because the scammer is usually out of state or in a foreign country.

Another variation of this scam that is

being reported is known as the "Secret Shopper" scam. In this case the victim agrees to work as a secret shopper at area retail stores. The victim is mailed the forged/counterfeit money orders or checks and is instructed to deposit and keep an agreed to amount, spend another smaller amount at the chosen store, submit a customer service report, and wire transfer the remainder of the money to another person. The amounts that victims have been required to reimburse have ranged from a few hundred to several thousand dollars.

Money order and classified ad employment scams are not new to Minot, but due to these recently received reports, the Minot Police Department wants to remind area residents to be extra cautious when sharing personal information when responding to classified ads. We also recommend not attempting to cash or deposit financial instruments that are in excess of agreed to amounts. If it does not feel right, or seems to go to be true, it probably isn't right or true.

Town & Country CU cuts member fees

Town & Country Credit Union recently decided to eliminate some fees for member services. The credit union removed 22 fees and decreased two others. A few that will no longer be charged include the annual Health Savings Account fee of \$25, the incoming wire transfer charge of \$10 per transfer, and the monthly \$5 dormant account charge.

"Cutting fees was one way that we could simplify things for our members and say thank you for trusting us with your money," said Jeremiah Kossen, president and CEO, Town & Country Credit Union.

The newly updated rate and charge schedule with the removed fees went into effect on Feb. 1, 2018. "Our commitment to providing the best value extends beyond just cutting fees," said Kossen. "We recently launched our Low Rate Guarantee which ensures members are receiving the best rate on home loans and lowered our Home Equity Loan rate to 2.99% Annual Percentage Rate."



Walter Piehl featured at the Taube

The Taube Museum of Art Main Gallery will feature mixed media acrylic paintings by Minot artist Walter Piehl. The Northern Plains National Heritage Area Suite features a series of eight large canvases that reflect local heritage and history that proved formative in the development of the United States. Each piece is connected with the public sites and locations along the free-flowing section of the Missouri River in the five North Dakota counties of Burleigh, McLean, Mercer, Morton and Oliver. Viewers to this exhibition can expect to see Piehl's expressionistic use of color, collage transfers, and his signature use of embedded old maps and other ephemera.

Piehl was selected for this commission because his work would be a contrasting style with the previous and prevalent contemporary representations of the landscape, people and cultures by the earliest as well as the present-day illustrators. Piehl stated, "My overriding intention was to make interesting standalone art works. I was also challenged and intrigued by the opportunity to educate and hopefully enrich the viewer by comparing and contrasting the more conventional styles other artists and photographers of the era used to deal with these major themes and my own expressionistic style."

The Northern Plains National Heritage Area is one of 49 such areas in the United States.
