<u>Minot woman designs fundraising t-shirts with signature from former Miss Rodeo America</u> Whittemore designs rodeo t-shirts in retro style

There's a special style of t-shirt going around Minot these days. It's pink, it's retro, and it's being sold for a good cause. The t-shirts were designed by a Minot resident, Kim Whittemore, who is an artist.

The annual Tough Enough to Wear Pink t-shirts are for sale in and around Minot, with all proceeds going to help improve the quality of life for people undergoing cancer treatment through the Trinity Exercise Rehab Program at the Minot Family YMCA.

On the front, in the shape of lips, much like the Stones' logo, are the words "Tough Enough." Above the lips are the words "Kiss Me, I'm" and below the words "Tough Enough," it reads "To Wear pink."

On the left sleeve is the signature of a North Dakota raised cowgirl, Ashley Andrews Alderson, who was chosen as the 2007 Miss Rodeo America.

T-shirts have been sold as fundraiser for the cause for more than a dozen

years, but the committee wanted to do something different this year.

So they asked Whittemore for ideas. Paul Kramer, a volunteer with the Minot Y's Men's Rodeo, had a sticker on a filing cabinet with the lips and asked Whittemore if she could do something with that design. She has created five other designs that will be used in future years.

"I wanted to do something different," Whittemore said, "to set it apart from other years."

Whittemore is no stranger to volunteering with benefits and causes. She, along with her husband Bruce, as well as Pat and Lynda Davy, hosted the Minot Bands Together for several years. Funds from that event went to the Tough Enough to Wear Pink campaign. The campaign is affiliated with the Minot Y's Men's Rodeo. Tough Enough to Wear Pink night at the rodeo will be Friday, Oct. 4. Since the campaign began with the rodeo in 2007, over \$717,000 has been raised and more than 550 people



have been helped.

This is the first in a series of t-shirts that will have the signatures of different North Dakota personalities on them.

The 65th annual Minot Y's Men's Rodeo is Oct. 4 - 6 at the All Seasons Arena at the North Dakota State Fair Center. Performances begin at 7 p.m. on Oct. 4 and 5, at 1 p.m. for the matinees on Oct. 5 and 6. Tickets range in price from \$13 to \$33 and can be purchased online at www.MinotYsMensRodeo.com. 



Disability Awareness Month brings attention to employment issues

Held each October, National Disability Employment Awareness Month (NDEAM), is a time to celebrate the many and varied contributions of American workers with disabilities. Federally recognized, NDEAM's goal is to bring attention to the struggles people with disabilities face in employment. The theme for this year, "The Right Talent, Right Now," marks the 74th year in observance. More often than not, people with disabilities have the skills and desire to work but are unrecognized and overlooked by employers. Many of these employees have specialty training and/or college degrees but unfortunately are the single largest untapped pool of potential employees.

Here in North Dakota, the US Census reports that our state leads the nation in the employment of people with disabilities at 56.3% but the efforts to increase workforce diversity need to continue.

Vocational Rehabilitation (VR) is an organization established to help people with disabilities gain and maintain employment. It is VR's mission to heighten awareness within the business community and assist individuals with disabilities improve their employment options. Exposing companies to people with disabilities goes a long way in breaking down the stigmas and barriers employers have about hiring someone with a disability. According to Vincenzo Piscopo of the Coca-Cola Company, "People with disabilities bring a unique skill set that is very valuable for companies." He went on to add that "As it relates to employment and competitiveness in the workplace, we have to stop thinking of disability as a liability and start thinking of it as an asset."

One of VR's goals is to help resolve employer's reluctance and apprehension about hiring people with disabilities. VR does this by providing pre-screened, qualified and reliable job applicants, on-thejob training incentives, ongoing support for the employee if needed, ADA information, disability awareness training, site assessment, technical assistance and tax credits for companies that hire people with disabilities. VR can also help companies maintain their seasoned and trained employees who may have acquired a disability while working at their company. Accommodations for these employees are often inexpensive and may include ergonomic changes to workspaces or lowcost adaptive equipment which in the long run saves the company's money in hiring and training costs.
