The process has been running smoothly, thanks to volunteer board members who have been working on committees, and thanks to the help of the Bismarck/Mandan Chamber/EDC President Brian Ritter, who laid out all the pros and cons of merging a city's chamber and economic development arm.

Intermodal rail service now operating out of Minot

Minot Area Development Corporation was joined by numerous partners to announce Rail Modal Group (RMG) Minot as the operator for intermodal rail service in North Dakota. This is an opportunity for intermodal service which allows producers and processors to load containers in Minot and ship them by rail to the ports for international destinations. The RMG facility will be served by BNSF Railway. For years, Minot has tried to identify partners willing to place containers in Minot, and RMG has made that commitment.

RMG has developed a network of privatelyoperated intermodal facilities providing services to inland containerized export shippers. In cooperation with BNSF Railway, RMG currently operates two other intermodal ramps located in Fremont, Nebraska and Amarillo, Texas. Multiple ocean carriers reposition trainloads of empty containers from surplus locations in Chicago Illinois, Memphis Tennessee, Dallas Texas, and other origins offering extensive export capacity.

"RMG is proud to support the producers and shippers throughout North Dakota and surrounding areas to provide international export capacity through our newly developed Port of Minot. Container source loading creates a vertical logistic solution that reduces transportation costs, reduces carbon footprint, and develops sustainable long-term International supply chains. All of these factors support growth for jobs and market expansion, while improving environmental impacts within the local and regional markets served by this asset," said RMG President/CEO Greg Oberting. "Our partnership with BNSF continues to grow with this opportunity to develop intermodal solutions for Minot."

The state has been working to gain access to intermodal service to reduce shipping costs for the state's agricultural producers and other industries for nearly two decades. "This gamechanging intermodal service will give North Dakota producers and processors much-needed access to competitively priced transportation, promoting the growth and diversification of our economy," Governor Burgum said. "We're grateful for the many partners at the local, state and federal level whose hard work and determination kept this effort on track and brought this critical service to our state."

Amy McBeth, BNSF Regional AVP Public Affairs added, "Rail transportation has always been integral to the Minot and state economies, and this new intermodal facility expands rail service even further. In addition to the intermodal facility, Minot hosts the only BNSF Certified Site in the state. The designation by BNSF identifies rail-served industrial sites that

have met stringent readiness standards intended to reduce development time and risk for companies seeking rail-served sites."

Minot's facility will provide service to The Northwest Seaport Alliance with ondock trains to terminals in Seattle and Tacoma. Representatives from the Northwest Seaport Alliance highlighted the importance of the North Dakota intermodal operations. "This new rail service means lower costs for our export customers in the Great Plains shipping valuable agricultural commodities through our gateway," said Peter Steinbrueck, Port of Seattle commission president and co-chair of The Northwest Seaport Alliance. "In the Puget Sound region, this service also supports new, additional cargo, which will help grow our market share and support more family-wage jobs."

"As one of the top agricultural export gateways in North America, The Northwest Seaport Alliance congratulates BNSF Railway, Rail Modal Group, the Minot Area Development Corporation, the City of Minot, and the State of North Dakota for their creative partnership in supporting the U.S. agricultural exports," said John McCarthy, Port of Tacoma commission president and co-chair of The Northwest Seaport Alliance. "As our nation recovers from the global pandemic, this is a great example of how ports and agricultural sectors drive economic growth."

Minot Mayor Shaun Sipma and Minot leaders focused in on the collaboration between all involved with bringing intermodal to North Dakota, including a thank you to the North Dakota congressional delegation, Governor Doug Burgum, legislators from across the state, the North Dakota Trade Office, the state departments of Commerce, Transportation and Agriculture, private industry, BNSF and the Northwest Seaport Alliance. Mayor Sipma also highlighted businesses who have selected the Minot Area as their home for operations. An anchor tenant to the MADC industrial park is AGT Foods. AGT Foods is one of the largest suppliers of value-added pulses, staple foods and food ingredients in the world and has been operating a facility in Minot, North Dakota since 2013. Eric Bartsch, Division Head Global Food Ingredients said, "AGT is excited for the intermodal service operations in Minot. Minot is a regional location that has served us well and the addition of intermodal service is a gamechanger for producers opening up access to global markets."

The first intermodal containers for the site arrived in Minot Tuesday, October 13 and are scheduled to make their way toward The Northwest Seaport Alliance in Washington state. Once the train arrives at the Port of Seattle, The Northwest Seaport Alliance will hold a press event and share more details on how this intermodal service provides access to the global market. The Northwest Seaport Alliance is a marine cargo operating partnership of the ports of Seattle and Tacoma.

Norsk Høstfest announces virtual Høstfest school

Norsk Høstfest is happy to announce a new resource now available online at http://hostfest.com/. On Høstfest Schoolfest you will find Scandinavian performances, videos, slide shows, lesson materials and links to other resources created by twenty plus artists from all over the U.S. and Scandinavia. Learn how to bake Swedish cookies, do a Norwegian dance, sing a song, play a tune, help Sigrid, the brave Viking girl, face up to a dragon or just sit back and listen to a concert by leading Nordic musicians. The resource was especially created to be used by teachers and students in Minot Public Schools, but as the site developed it became evident the resource could be enjoyed by people of any age and anywhere around the world.

When Norsk Høstfest was cancelled this year because of the pandemic, musician Ross Sutter, who has been part of Høstfest in the Schools and Scandinavian Youth Camp since they were first started in the 1990s, reached out to Norsk Høstfest and Minot Public Schools in the hope that Scandinavian artists would still be able to visit. When it became evident that even school visits would not be possible, the online program idea was born. Funding was secured and the idea began to take shape. Many current and former artists who have been involved in the program responded and began submitting videos and links to other materials and as a result, the Høstfest Schoolfest web project became a reality.

The site is currently live and will be online through the month of October. It will be offline for editing and additions in November and December and then will reappear for the month of January. It is hoped that this site can become an archive for Norsk Høstfest - a record of the outstanding and great variety of programs that have been offered in Minot Schools over the years. There are many resources available right now but keep checking back for more artists being added soon. Danish fiddler Kristain Bugge, the Larssons of southern Sweden, Antti Järvelä of Finland and Stina Fagertun of Tromsø, Norway will all be submitting performances in the coming weeks.


and was very active in the MSU Student

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City Council selects finalists for city manager position

The Minot City Council has chosen three finalists for the City Manager position.

The Council met Oct. 22 in executive session to choose finalists from a list of nine semifinalists. A recruitment firm hired by the City interviewed all 50 applicants and identified the pool of semi-finalists. The three finalists will be interviewed in Minot on Nov 4-5.

The finalists are:

- Shawn W. Henessee, former county manager in Clark County, Wash.
- Harold L. Stewart II, current city manager in Warrensburg, Mo.
- Ray O. Agbabiaka, current director of community development in Matteson, Ill. Meet-the-candidate videos will be provided through the City's Facebook page and Youtube channel, and a virtual open house will be held on Nov. 4. Residents will have the ability to submit questions to the candidates through Facebook or YouTube during the virtual open house.

On Nov. 5, the three finalists will take

part in two interviews and a tour of the city. Interviews will be conducted with the City Council and with a separate panel of stakeholders. Because of COVID-19 gathering restrictions, community members are encouraged to watch the interviews through the City's social media platforms or on local cable channel 19.

City of Minot seeking public input on Broadway study

The City of Minot is seeking public input on a Broadway corridor study to determine issues and concerns with the busiest roadway in the community.

City Engineer Lance Meyer said the Minot City Council approved funding in April 2019 for the Broadway study through the North Dakota Department of Transportation. The project will study the entire Broadway corridor.

"What we're really looking for now is input from the public on what their concerns are and where they see issues because it helps us as engineers and planners design a better corridor," Meyer said. "Normally we would hold an open house to meet with the public, but with COVID-19 restrictions, we're instead conducting a virtual open house."

Anyone who wants to offer concerns or ask questions about Broadway can log on to moving broadway.com, a website created to collect public input. Questions or suggestions can also be submitted through email at Bethany.brandt-sargent@kljeng.com or by calling 701-232-5353. The deadline for comments is Nov. 15.

"We encourage anyone with concerns or issues related to Broadway to use one of these methods to share their information with us," Meyer said. "We want and need public input to design the best corridor possible heading into the future."


Artists invited to participate in "Festival of the Arts" sale at Taube

Rare Earth Salts is operating out of Beatrice, NE, with 13 full-time employees and an internship program which has pro-

vided positions to two MSU alumni and one current MSU student. The company is active in research and development, and is working with the University of North Dakota on producing rare earth oxides from coal.

Brewer and his wife Kayla have five children with another due in January.
