STATE OF THE CITY "THE FUTURE OF MINOT LOOKS BRIGHT"

Minot Mayor Shaun Sipma delivered the State of the City address to a packed room at the former Cognizant building on Friday, February 18. The location of the new high school, the Cognizant building was the perfect setting for his forward-looking speech focusing on the major wins of 2021 in economic development, flood protection, expansion, and growth and how those choices are setting Minot up for success in the future.

Mayor Sipma reflected on a year of big moves forward for the City of Minot: Trinity Health's new campus, activity at the intermodal facility, the new City Hall project, Mouse River Flood Enhancement Project phases being completed, and the new fire station – to name a few.

"The choices our predecessors made set us on our current path, and the choices we are making today will move our community into the future," said Sipma. "We have purposefully and willingly made difficult choices on things like NAWS, flood control, a new high school, all things that will make Minot a better and more resilient community well into the future."

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Mayor Sipma called out the efforts of the Minot Area Chamber EDC completing the merger and staying true to the goal of creating opportunities for new and exisiting businesses. One such opportunity was realized in 2021: the nationally recognized industrial park now includes a busy intermodal facility. It is the largest such distribution hub between Chicago and Seatle, and not coincidentally, is adjacent to the only BNSF Site Certified property in North Dakota. He also thanked the businesses seeking to fulfill their growth potential while fostering partnerships

including Hess Corporation and AGT Foods. "Minot has a lot ot offer businesses, large and small, and we will continue to tell Minot's story to the world."

Mayor Sipma thanked the many community partners vital to Minot's success. "Public schools, Minot State, Minot Air Force Base, local, state, and federal lawmakers, the Minot Chamber EDC, Magic Fund, State Water Commission, Souris River Joint Board, and more. All of these things work together for the betterment of Minot."

During his address, Sipma recognized Eric Locken as Minot's Citizen of the Year. Nominated by several people, Locken was described as a dedicated community member and volunteer with unique and effective fundraising ideas that have made a real impact across the community. Locken recieved a \$1,000 donation courtesy of Farmers Union Insurance to donate to the charity of his choice. Locken chose Project Bee.

While the City of Minot has overcome many challenges in previous years, the future of the Magic City looks bright.

APPLICATIONS SOUGHT FOR AARP COMMUNITY CHALLENGE GRANT

DEADLINE TO APPLY IS MARCH 22

AARP North Dakota invites local organizations and governments across the state to apply for the 2022 AARP Community Challenge grant program now through March 22, 2022. Grants fund quick-action projects that help communities become more livable in the long term by improving public spaces, transportation, housing, civic engagement, coronavirus recovery, diversity and inclusion, and more.

AARP will prioritize proposals that are inclusive, address disparities, directly engage volunteers, support residents age 50 and older and aim to achieve one or more of the following outcomes:

- Support communities' efforts to build engagement and leverage funding available under new federal programs through laws like the American Rescue Plan Act, the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act and more.
- Create vibrant public places that improve open spaces, parks and access to other amenities.
- Deliver a range of transportation and mobility options that increase connectivity, walkability, bikeability, wayfinding, access to transportation options and roadway improvements.
- Support a range of housing options that increases the availability of accessible and affordable choices.
- Ensure a focus on diversity, equity and inclusion while improving the built and social environment of a community.
- Increase civic engagement with innovative and tangible projects that bring residents and local leaders together to address challenges and facilitate a greater sense of inclusion.
- Other community improvements including health services, community development and coronavirus pandemic recovery.

Since 2017, AARP has awarded 15 in North Dakota through the Community Challenge. Previous projects have enabled long-term progress by garnering additional support from public and private funders, encouraging similar improvements throughout the community, advancing local policy, and generating engagement among residents and local leaders to advocate for change.

The Community Challenge is open to 501(c)(3), 501(c)(4) and 501(c)(6) nonprofits and government entities. Other types of organizations are considered on a case-by-case basis. Grants can range from several hundred dollars for small, short-term activities to tens of thousands for larger projects.

The application deadline is 4 p.m. March 22. All projects must be completed by Nov. 30, 2022. To submit an application and view past grantees, visit www.AARP.org/CommunityChallenge.

AGENCY RECOGNIZES PARTNERS WHO PROMOTE AFFORDABLE HOMEOWNERSHIP

North Dakota Housing Finance Agency (NDHFA) recently recognized nine of its partners with Champion of Affordable Housing Awards for their outstanding promotion and delivery of its homeownership programs.

"Homeownership is traditionally one of the most coveted goals of individuals and families," said NDHFA Executive Director Dave Flohr. "Through our Champion Awards, North Dakota Housing Finance Agency honors the housing professionals who partner with the agency, promote our programs, and help to make homeownership affordable."

NDHFA's FirstHome™ program provides low- to moderate-income buyers with low-cost mortgages, and down payment and closing cost assistance. Single parents, veterans, and families with disabled or elderly households members can qualify for similar help through HomeAccess. The agency's North Dakota Roots program assists households who require down payment assistance to buy again or whose income exceeds the limits of the agency's standard programs. The program can also be used to refinance residential real estate loans.

Two loan officers, Debby Wisdom of Dakota Community Bank & Trust in Mandan and Lisa Thuner of Town & Country Credit Union in Minot each received a Homeownership Performance Award, recognition for the volume and quality of loans produced. NDHFA also presented three real estate agents with the same award, Aruna G. Hagen of Advantage Realtors in West Fargo, Kym Enlow of Coldwell Banker in Grand Forks, and Karen Johnston of George & Associates Realty in Watford City.

Bremer Bank, Bravera Bank and The Union Bank all received NDHFA's Award of Excellence for best practices and outstanding delivery of the agency's homeownership programs. Unify Home Lending Inc. was honored with a Rising Star award, recognition of a financial institution new to our program for a significant increase in loan volume over the previous year.

"Historically low interest rates and a limited inventory made the housing market very competitive this past year," said Flohr. "North Dakota Housing Finance Agency helped 1,548 individuals and families to successfully purchase a home in 2021, all of the buyers learning about our homeownership programs from one of our outstanding housing partners."

MINOT POLICE WARN OF SCAM

The Minot Police Department has received reports of a scam attempt resurfacing in the Magic City. Residents are reporting a variation on what is known as the "Jury Duty" scam. Would be victims are being called by scammers informing them they have a warrant for their arrest, supposedly for "missing a subpoena service". In order for the victim to clear the warrant without being arrested, they are being directed to pay the bond by "Moneypak" gift cards. Also, the scammers fraudulently appear to be calling from the Minot Police Department on caller-ID through the use of "phone spoofing" apps. These apps permit the caller to make it look as if they are calling from any number they wish.

The Minot Police Department reminds the community that area law enforcement never receives bond for active warrants over the phone and will not direct anyone to used prepaid cards of any kind. The only way to clear active warrants is in-person; either by arrest in the community or of if the defendant turns themselves in to a law enforcement agency or the courts. If someone gets a call saying otherwise, or for any other reason must pay immediately via prepaid cards, IT IS A SCAM. The best defense is to simply hang up.





ESSENTIALS FOR LEARNING GROWS WITH SECOND DELIVERIES

FWBT has expanded the mission of Essentials For Learning to include any items that would be considered high need, such as snacks, backpacks, winter clothing, items for special projects, etc.

Trinity Health Foundation recently received a \$50,000 donation from retired nurse, Joanne Quale, to aid in the creation of Trinity Health's Resiliency Room.

The Covid-19 pandemic has had an unprecedented effect on healthcare. In addition to the devastation it has caused, it has brought new challenges and demands to nurses, providers, and staff around the world. We are feeling it acutely at Trinity Health. Because of the nursing shortage, current nursing staff are working more shifts and longer hours to meet the needs of patient care. As we entered the second year of the pandemic, the extra challenges and work demands continued to take a toll physically and mentally on the nursing staff. It is critical for Trinity Health to provide more support to help nurses with the additional stress and potential burn out.

Karen Zimmerman, Trinity Health's Chief Nursing Officer and Vice President of Patient Care Services had the idea for the Resiliency Room and reached out to the Trinity Health Foundation for help with this project. "Covid has tremendously impacted our front-line staff, especially our newer nurses. They have seen things in a short-time that many of us only see over a lifetime. This has left many of them struggling with mental health issues (similar to PTSD) requiring therapy, sometimes medication, and support to help them cope. As I look at ways to help them, it was apparent that we do not have a place for people to go to truly regroup or take a "restful" break. Our breakrooms are often busy with several people in them; our lunch room is busy; and the chapel is not always the first choice for people. I wanted to create a serene space where people can go to refuel and refresh (even if it is for 5 minutes)" said Karen Zimmerman.

As a result, the Resiliency Room was created through a generous \$50,000 donation from Joanne Quale, a robust supporter of the nursing community and Trinity Health Foundation programs. The room is dedicated to Ruth Rexine, who has been a Trinity nurse for 50 years.

The Resiliency Room is a place where nurses can take a break, find respite, or just catch their breath. A room at the current hospital has been remodeled to include painting the room a soothing color, adding soft flooring, and furnishing it with two massage chairs with curtains draped between each chair for privacy. Trinity Health Foundation has also donated two electronic tablets downloaded with calming meditative apps. The room has also been stocked with a small fridge containing bottles of water and ice packs for the nurses. The furnishings in the room will be utilized now in the current hospital and will then be moved to the new campus in 2023, once opened.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING OPPORTUNITY AT KENWOOD ON 5TH APARTMENTS

Essential service workers in our community can still take advantage of North Dakota's Housing Incentive Fund program which brought affordable housing options to areas affected during the oil boom.

In Minot, Kenwood on 5th Apartments is one such community where lower rental rates are offered to individuals who qualify as essential service workers. Located in NW Minot, Kenwood on 5th offers open layouts with fully equipped kitchens, central heat and air, private patio/balcony and off-street parking. The building also features an elevator, community room, on-site laundry, and garages.



In May of 2020, the North Dakota Housing Finance Agency, that oversees the HIF program, was able to expand its definition of

essential service workers. The state previously defined Essential Service Workers as an individual employed by a city, county, school district, medical or long-term care facility, the State of North Dakota, or others as determined by the Agency who fulfills an essential public service.

NDHFA expended its ESW definition to include an individual employed by a city, county or tribal government, public school district, the State of North Dakota, the North Dakota National Guard, a medical facility, childcare provider, grocer, farming operation, or other employer as determined by the agency that provides an essential public service. Examples of eligible employers can include clinic, hospital, surgical, outpatient, dental care, hospice, long-term care, rehabilitation, pharmacy, medical supplier or other facility as determined by NDHFA.

CELEBRATE 90 YEARS OF JOHN WILLIAMS WITH THE MINOT SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA

The Minot Symphony Orchestra invites you to an evening celebrating one of America's most accomplished composers, John Williams, on Saturday, March 5th starting with a pre-concert talk from 6:30 to 7:00pm and music at 7:30 pm in Ann Nicole Nelson Hall, located inside Old Main on the campus of Minot State University.

In a career that spans five decades, John Williams has become one of America's most accomplished and successful composers for film and for the concert stage. Mr. Williams has received a variety of prestigious awards, including the National Medal of Arts, the Kennedy Center Honor, the Olympic Order, numerous Academy Awards, Grammy Awards, Emmy Awards, and Golden Globe Awards. He remains one of our nation's most distinguished and contributive musical voices and has composed music and served as music director for more than one hundred films.

The symphony will perform some of Williams' most popular scores including The Cowboys Overture (1972), Flying Theme (from E.T. The Extra-Terrestrial, (1982)), Theme from Jurassic Park (1993), Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone Suite (2001), and the Star Wars Suite for Orchestra (1977).

The concert will also feature the winner of the annual Minot State University Division of Performing Arts Honors Competition, Rachel (Dockter) Voth. She will perform Henri Tomasi's Concerto for Alto Saxophone and Orchestra. Voth was chosen through a live audition.

Rachel (Dockter) Voth is a Minot native and senior at Minot State University majoring in music education. Music has always been a big part of her life. She began taking piano lessons from her grandmother Arnola Leverson at 8 years old. Rachel won the North Dakota Music Teacher National Association (MTNA) Young Artist Performance for the Woodwind Division her Sophomore and Senior year. She has been a member of the MSU Big Dam Jazz Band, MSU Concert Band, chamber ensembles, MSU Concert Choir, and plays second violin in the Minot Symphony Orchestra.

"Rachel's work for the last four years has been aiming for an opportunity just like this. As a music education student, she spends as much time in the practice room as a performance major, earning her first prize at the North Dakota Music Teacher Association Young Artist competition in both 2019 and 2021. Her hard-earned technique is stunning, and her playing tells a captivating story. Henri Tomasi's tonal language evokes the best parts of the exoticism explored by his French predecessors Ravel and Debussy and his contemporary, Milhaud. In many parts of the concerto, interjected between virtuosic statements from the saxophone are heavy brass chords and lush, sensual string lines, lending a sense of epic. The overall effect fits right in with the sweeping scores of John Williams," said Charles Young Assistant Professor of Woodwinds and Director of Jazz Studies, Minot State University.

COMMUNICATION MATTERS LAB OPEN IN HARTNETT HALL

The broadcasting and professional communication department revealed its new Communication Matters lab located on the west first floor of Hartnett Hall during the Fall 2021 semester. The lab can be used by not only communication majors but anyone on campus that has communication research or work they need to conduct.

"It started with buy-in from all of our faculty who conduct research and do various teaching exercises on a daily basis," said Christina Paxman, associate professor and program coordinator for the professional communication department. "A lot of what we do is already done in our offices or classrooms, but we really need a space dedicated to all of those things that would have additional tools that we don't have. It's a teaching and research resource for students and faculty. The space can be used by members of other departments whose work resembles some aspect of communication."



The lab is mainly set up for research purposes or two-way communication, but has the ability to serve many other purposes for both students and faculty on campus.

"One of the great things about the lab is that we have three cameras that can allow us to videotape and analyze the communication from multiple perspectives. It also has a ceiling mounted microphone, a TV screen, and rolling stackable chairs," Paxman said.

"We've had all the chairs out and in a circle to conduct a focus group for my public relations class. And we've had the chairs stacked and moved to the side so a student can give a practice speech for intro to public speaking. Those are just a couple examples of what we do, but other things include one on one interviews with research participants, mock job interviews, guest lectures, and even teaching exercises,"

The lab is also equipped with collaborative ultra for classes to use for a better learning experience.

"We have the ability to do an exercise in the lab while another class is linked in and observing online," Paxman said. "For example, when I'm teaching interpersonal communication, if students wanted to do an experiment about nonverbal communication and deception, they could create the experiment, have confederates and be running through that while another class is analyzing. It allows for a lot of creative teaching exercises and also interdisciplinary work across campus."

Although most of the work currently being done in the lab is specific to communication classes or research, Paxman hopes that as time goes on, the lab will be more versatile and students and faculty from other departments feel comfortable using the lab to their advantage.

"At any point along the way, students might have course work involved in the lab, and then it's also available to anyone across campus doing any communication related project. For example, if anyone studies science communication, this would be a great space to conduct that research. Lots of faculty do interdisciplinary research on this and other campuses," she said.

"Sertomans throughout the United States and Canada are dedicated to creating communities that serve the needs of many," said Amy Ellington, Sertoma interim executive director. "We created this grant program to help members like Sertoma of Minot support community charitable programs and organizations."



"A goal of Sertoma is to raise public awareness of hearing related issues. The number of people, the age ranges affected, and the health implications are much broader than the general public might suspect," said David Gowen, Minot Sertoma Club president. "But there are things that can be done, like the work of MSU's Deaf Mentor Program. And through better education of hearing health issues, Sertoma's hope is that we can increase awareness and erase public stigma about hearing loss and make communication accessible to everyone."

PHASE 1 OF FLOOD PROTECTION PROJECT EARNS NATIONAL RECOGNITION

The ongoing flood protection project has earned more national recognition. Phase 1 of the Mouse River Enhanced Flood Protection Plan received the 2021 Crown Communities Award from American City & County, a national organization dedicated to recognizing public projects and servants that have a substantial impact on constituents. Phases 2 and 3 earned a similar award last year.

"It's an honor for me to be involved in a project of this magnitude because there are so many agencies and partners working together to provide protection for the Souris River basin," said Dan Jonasson, director of Public Works for the City of Minot and a director for the Souris River Joint Board. "Phase 1 was a vital part of the entire project, and I'm happy to see the hard work and cooperation recognized."

The City of Minot collaborates with many partners on the overall project, including the Souris River Joint Board, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Federal Emergency Management Administration, the North Dakota State Water Commission, the Minot Park District, and the Ward County Water Board, as well as elected officials at the local, state, and federal levels.

The roughly \$43 million Phase1 created new concrete floodwalls and other components, including approximately 3,000 feet of new roadway, 45,000 cubic yards of dirt, a new 190,000 gallon per minute pump station, a 40,000 gallon per minute sanitary lift station, and 18,000 feet of utility reconstruction.
